

The Eucharist: Source & Summit History, Old Testament Types: The Passover – Unleavened Bread (Pars Tertia, 21 April 2024)

DESPITE THE EAST-WEST ARGUMENTS and even in this new era of détente where the Patriarch of Constantinople himself is making overtures of a willingness to accept a common date for the celebration of Easter, Latin custom of using unleavened bread – made from wheat and water only, as the law of the Church frequently has occasion to remind - for the Eucharist persists. The Code of Canon Law itself emphasizes that "the bread," used for the Eucharist "must be only wheat and recently made so that there is no danger of spoiling" (can 924 §2), offering essentially a recipe or a prescription which does not include yeast or other leavening agent. The Dicastery for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the



Sacraments was much more direct in its 2004 Instruction Redemptionis Sacramentum, providing:

The bread used in the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharistic Sacrifice must be unleavened, purely of wheat, and recently made so that there is no danger of decomposition. It follows therefore that bread made from another substance, even if it is grain, or if it is mixed with another substance different from wheat to such an extent that it would not commonly be considered wheat bread, does not constitute valid matter for confecting the Sacrifice and the Eucharistic Sacrament. It is a grave abuse to introduce other substances, such as fruit or sugar or honey, into the bread for confecting the Eucharist. Hosts should obviously be made by those who are not only distinguished by their integrity, but also skilled in making them and furnished with suitable tools (§48)


This is the immediate answer to the question of why unleavened bread is used at the Mass, i.e.: that is what the law of the Church provides, and Christ left to her custody of the sacraments, including the clarification of the matter and form for each of the seven sacraments. While it is sometimes dissatisfying to answer "why" with "because so-and-so said so," it is nonetheless honest and is a sign of our willingly submission of the intellect and the will to the teaching of the Church.

At the next level, the Church in the Latin West has consistently noted that Christ Himself used unleavened bread and wine made from grapes at the Last Supper, and that His choice to use these elements is not merely exemplary but binding. Throughout her life, as missionary endeavors brought the faith to new and varied regions of the world where unleavened wheat bread and wine from grapes were not staples or in some regions not available without some hardship, the Church has nonetheless insisted that these are the only valid elements for the Eucharist and that to use other elements is invalid. When a reason is offered, mention is almost always made of Christ's own action. The same is true contemporarily, as the Church provides pastoral and sacramental care to persons living with Celiac disorder: the Church suggests, first, that such persons be communicated from the chalice and, failing that, allows that a low gluten host may be consecrated for that person, but such consecrated hosts are not to be reserved or extended to other members of the faithful. Even in these situations the Dicastery for Divine Worship and the Dicastery for the Doctrine of the Faith have both referred to Jesus Christ's own use of unleavened wheat bread and grape wine for the institution of the Eucharist.

The explanation for the Christ's choice is certainly, as we have seen, that the Eucharist was established within the context of the Passover meal, which the Lord Himself tells us He had longed to eat with His apostles (Lk 22:15) The Eucharist is, thereby, inextricably linked to the Passover by Christ's own divine choice, not coincidentally by force of the calendar. He *eagerly desired to eat this Passover* with the Apostles, because He – as He Himself tells us – He is was establishing the *new covenant* in His Blood, with the unleavened bread of the Passover become His Body and the blessing cup of Passover become His Blood, the flesh and blood of a slaughtered lamb, being replaced by the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of the Lamb of God, who goes willingly to slaughter, not opening his mouth (c.f., Is 53:7). As much as Christ's own words at the Last Supper stand at the heart of the Eucharistic Prayer and have often been pointed to as the consecratory moment, so too the elements used by Christ are obligatory and cannot, to the Church's mind, be substituted for anything else, convenient or inconvenient.

I want to say here, as it will have further echoes down the road of our journey in these columns, that, in the sweep of Salvation History, the historical – as opposed to the chronological – is more than simply using dates and times to place things in order (while trying to avoid the post hoc ergo propter hoc fallacy), to find coincidences (in the purest meaning of the term), and to have a manageable filing systems for data. Salvation History aggregates and does so with a purpose: it is the History of the Cosmos whose end is already known, the fullness of the revelation of Kingdom of God in the Last Judgment and the life of the New Heaven and New Earth, and which is gradually being disclosed and advanced along each step of the way. While individual, free moral agents, that is us, are not predestined, the humanity, and all creation with it, is destined for life with God. Along the way of this ever-advancing story of salvation, the Lord God chooses some elements as more than constitutive, more than essentially, but truly necessary (without which there can be nothing): this family, that people; this royal line, that priesthood; this meal, that sacrifice; this Son, His Sacrifice. Indeed, the point of these columns on Eucharistic antetypes has been to show that the Eucharist itself was not some kind of last minute plan hatched by the Father and the Son to save us from death, but was indeed intended from the foundation of the world. In other words, seen from Salvation History's point of view – something closer to the divine view point than our merely chronological accounting of things – God created wheat for the Eucharist, He proposed the Passover so that there could be a Last Supper, the unleavened bread of the Sedar – scripturally and historically linked to the fact that, in their hasty exodus from Egypt, there was no time to fully knead the dough and allow the bread to rise before baking it (see Dt 16:3) – a reminder that we too are beating a hasty exodus from slavery to sin to life in God.

Theologically and spiritually, yeast, or leaven in the New Testament, is often equated with sin, impurity and hypocrisy: Jesus said to them, "Look out, and beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and Sadducees" (Mt 16:6, c.f. Mt 11–12; Mk 8:15; Lk 12:1; 1 Cor 5:6–8; & Gal 5:9). And thus unleavened bread comes to symbolize sincerity, purity and integrity. But, Christ himself also spoke to them another parable. "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed with three measures of wheat flour until the whole batch was leavened" (Mt 13:3). Leaving aside the fact that three measure of wheat flour is a tremendous amount, enough to feed one hundred people, more or less, Christ's allusion to the inexorable spread of the Kingdom by use of the simile of yeast, does certainly offer our brothers and sisters in the Greek East reassurance in their choice for leavened bread in the Eucharist, while in the Latin West we stand with the element originally used.


