JUNE IS MEN'S HEALTH MONTH

Dental Health

You have heard throughout your life how crucial it is to brush our teeth and floss every day. However, it is important to remember that caring for your teeth and gums does more than improve your smile and breath. In fact, good dental hygiene may actually reduce your risk of ulcers, pneumonia, digestive problems, heart disease, stroke and diabetes.

Gum Disease/Gingivitis: Being proactive in making dental hygiene a part of your everyday routine is imperative to have a healthy mouth. If you commit to working with your dentist and following the suggestions, you'll improve your chances of keeping your teeth – and your health – for a lifetime.

What's really going on in your mouth? There are millions of harmless as well as destructive bacteria in your mouth, invisible to the human eye. Helpful bacteria break down the food you eat for easy digestion while damaging bacteria can clump together to create plaque – a sticky, acidic substance that builds up on teeth. We all get plaque on our teeth at one point in time and it is perfectly normal. If it is regularly removed (by brushing and flossing every day), plaque is harmless. But if left on your teeth, plaque begins to eat away and decay your teeth, which will ultimately cause cavities and gum disease. Over time, the bones and tissue that hold your teeth can be destroyed and your teeth may become loose and/or fall out.

Cancers

Each year, over 700,000 men are diagnosed with cancer and nearly 300,000 die from the disease. During the course of a lifetime half of all men will get cancer at least once. Cancer can strike anyone, at any age, but the majority of cases happen to people 55 and over.

The saddest part about all of this is that most of these cancers and deaths are preventable. At least one-third of cancer deaths are caused by smoking, and another one-third <u>may be caused</u> by poor diet and/or lack of exercise. The two keys to beating cancer are early detection and reducing risk. The following are common types of cancers found in men. Browse through each type to find out information such as symptoms, treatment options and prevention tips for each condition/disease: Breast cancer, gastric cancer (stomach cancer), prostate cancer, testicular cancer (mainly affects men between the ages of 20 and 39 according the NIH.)

Prostate cancer is the leading cancer for men in the US. It is followed by lung cancer and then colorectal cancer. The fourth most common cancer is race dependent: bladder cancer for Caucasian men, cancer of the mouth and throat for African American men, kidney/renal cancer for American Indian/Alaska Native males and Hispanic males, and stomach cancer for Asian/Pacific Island men.
